This image is of Lorado Taft's "Fountain of Time" sculpture in Chicago. Considered one of Chicago's most significant historical artworks, it is stunning and was inspired by Henry Austin Dobson's poem, "Paradox of Time."

Time goes, you say? Ah no! Alas, Time stays, we go; Or else, were this not so, What need to chain the hours, For Youth were always ours? Time goes, you say?-ah no!

The sculpture depicts a hooded Father Time carrying a scythe, watching over a parade of 100 figures arranged in an arc. If you look closely, you will see that the overall shape of the sculpture resembles a cone or pyramid. This procession of people is meant to illustrate the entire spectrum of humanity at various stages of life.

I love this illustration of time. As your eyes move over the 100 figures you begin to realize that we - in the here and now - are simply a blink in the history of time. And isn't it curious that in our daily lives, it can sometimes feel as though time is just crawling along; while other times it seems to fly by?

Time: continuance, duration, season, moment - we as a church have taken our time to make a decision on moving back to two Sunday worship services. After the COVID shut down, our council decided to go from two services to one, as our second service had very light attendance. We wanted to create the sense of a full church once again and gather the family of Christ together, for gathering together for worship is essential. Hebrews 10:25 says, We must not quit meeting together, as some are doing. No, we need to keep on encouraging each other. This becomes more and more important...

After last year we have seen growth in our attendance with many new members joining the church. We have hit the thresh hold of 200 in attendance consistently. So starting on September 10^{th,} "Rally Sunday" we will move back to two services. The first service will be at 9am and the second service will be at 10:30am.

As we move to two worship services, we will need double the volunteers to help. We also need to have a critical attendance at the 10:30am service so that it is welcoming to visitors and the sanctuary does not feel empty. With this additional worship service, we will need your help in volunteering, we will need your attendance, and we will need your prayers and support as we move forward.

And when given an opportunity to contribute to the life of the church, they build relationships with Christians who are ahead of them on their faith journey – which is vital to a child's faith over the long haul. The most effective way to learn about God is through example, and that's where we come in. After all, a healthy family consists of grandparents, aunts, uncles, parents, and children. Our church family is no different.

I read over and over again that 85% of people who come to faith in Christ do so before the age of 18. So laying the foundation of God and the Gospel in the hearts of children in their early years is significant; a child's view of God is formed in their early years. It's like planting seeds that will grow into saving faith when they are older. *This is our greatest mission field.* Remember that there is no "Junior Holy Spirit" - kids come to Jesus just as adults do – God answers their prayers just as He does ours. He moves in their hearts just as He does in ours. In fact, the Bible tells us to act like kids rather than telling kids to act like us!

Worshiping with children is important to all of us. It helps us to examine how we engage with each other in our faith. We are reminded to be open to the spontaneity and mystery of the Holy Spirit and that God is most certainly present in the messiness of our lives. It also provides opportunities for us to practice patience and grace as we encounter God through the eyes and faith of a child.

Let's not forget about the parents of our children – for "When you take a child by that hand, you take a parent by the heart." It is essential that we partner with our young parents to walk with them on their faith journey, too. We've all heard the saying, it takes a village to raise a child – well it takes a church to raise a child in the way of Christ! Young parents look to their church family for all ages that will care for their children. They want volunteers who are loving and caring. And let's face it, children can't get to church by themselves, they rely on their parents to bring them. So when you see young parents bringing their children to church, take the time to thank them. It requires work and effort to get everyone ready and loaded up for church – so let's do what we can to show them our gratitude. Let's show them that we believe that children and youth are not just the church of tomorrow, they are the church of today as well at Lutheran Church of the Cross.

So – we have nurtured our children to embrace living like Jesus. How do we keep this going as they reach their adolescent and teen years (which, by the way is a very important and challenging time in their development)? How do we keep them coming back to church as they outgrow Cross Kids and become confirmed members of our church family?

We can start by helping them continue to grow in their relationship with the Lord. We can keep in mind that part of our job is to prepare them to be the communities and churches. God used young people to do great

things and we should, too. Think of Timothy – who God used to lead the Ephesian church, and told him: You are young, but don't let anyone treat you as if you are not important. Be an example to show the believers how they should live. Show them by what you say, by the way you live, by your love, by your faith, and by your pure life. (1 Timothy 4:12). That said, we must keep in mind their intrinsic value – their value just as they are, because they are created in God's image. Their importance cannot be solely based on their potential.

Their presence in church is necessary, for they keep us fresh – they are passionate and want to know about Jesus – they crave a relationship with Him that will give them meaning, purpose and love. As teenagers, they become co-laborers and co-creators with us, and possess God-given gifts to use and share. They bring a new perspective in that they are living in an *ever-changing* culture and need to learn to apply the *never-changing* Word to their everyday lives. They bring vibrancy, positivity and energy to the church. Combine that with the guidance and the benefit of the experience and wisdom of our older members and it's a winning combination. It looks like WE NEED EACH OTHER!

We must continue to build meaningful relationships with our youth so that they feel more confident In their ability to make an impact for Christ in their daily life and in their future, especially when life hands them challenges. Helping them continue to grow in their prayer and spiritual life is essential. We need to raise them up so that they can continue the church and 'keep running the race.'

Providing opportunities for activities and service (both church-based and non-church-based) will allow them to have fun and build their sense of worth as well as help them be empathetic and see the importance of fairness and inclusivity. And just as important as providing those opportunities is participating WITH them now and then – even if it means only watching. Find out what activities they are in and ask about them, or better yet, go watch a game/match or enjoy a concert/performance that they are participating in.

<u>It's all about relationships.</u> I also read over and over again how young adults are more likely to stay involved in church after high school if they had at least one significant relationship with an adult in their church growing up (a non-family member). Could that person be you? My hat is off to those of you who make it a point to reach out and connect with the youth of our church and/or accept the invitation to be a confirmation mentor. You will make an impact that just may be life-changing for a young member, and you might just realize some benefits yourself. Never forget that we need each other to keep growing in faith.

As always, I thank you for your support and prayers. This is a great church family to serve and I am grateful for the opportunity. Together we can achieve great things for God!

Myusic Notes August 2023 Hymn of the Month



Creating God, Your Fingers Trace (PROSPECT)

Text: Jeffery Rowthorn; Music: W. Walker, Southern Harmony, 1835

- 1. Creating God, your fingers trace the bold designs of farthest space; Let sun and moon and stars and light and what lies hidden praise your might.
- 2. Sustaining God, your hands uphold earth's myst'ries known or yet untold; Let water's fragile blend with air, enabling life, proclaim your care.
- 3. Redeeming God, your arms embrace all now despised for creed or race; Let peace, descending like a dove, make known on earth your healing love.
- 4. Indwelling God, your gospel claims on fam'ly with a billion names; Let ev'ry life be touched by grace until we praise you face to face.

In keeping consistent with singing lots of God's lovely creation hymns, our hymn of the month for August is "Creating God, Your Fingers Trace". As you read in the verses above, Jeffery Rowthorn wanted to express creation by our immense universe, God's loving embrace of all His people and our indwelling God told to us by the Gospel.

Jeffery Rowthorn (b. 1934) is a Welsh retired Anglican bishop and hymn writer. His early career was spent in the Church of England. Later he moved to the United States and worked at the Union Theological Seminary in New York City and Berkeley Divinity School in New Haven, Connecticut.

According to his book Singing Songs of Expectation, Rowthorn expressed his intentions for his hymn:

- 1. To use inclusive language throughout and in particular by addressing each stanza to God;
- 2. To depict the ongoing and unceasing activity of each person of the Trinity by using active present participle (creating, etc.) rather than just static "Father";
- 3. To evoke awe and wonder ("water's fragile blend with air, enabling life") and the recognition that our knowledge of the universe remains at best partial ("earth's mysteries known or yet untold")
- 4. To emphasize the radical barrier-free love of God for all;
- 5. And to use "billion" in the final stanza, even though at first some resisted its use; today "two billion" (the number of Christians in the world) or "six billion" (the number of people on earth) would make the point I was trying to make in 1974 when I used "billion".

The tune PROSPECT is from William Walker's *The Southern Harmony,* a hymnal of a compilation of southern Appalachian folk tunes.

A Message on our ELCA Global Missionary

Russian Correspondent- Bradn Buerkle

Mission with a New Direction – exploration of opportunities for international theological education Since arriving in Germany, the Hermannsburg Mission has sought ways to maximize the skills and experience I gained in Russia for the good of the mission's other partners around the world. Part of that work includes speaking in Germany about the state of affairs in Russia in general and the churches in particular; more of my ministry, however, is aimed at finding ways to encourage mutual enrichment in the field of theological education. My particular focus in the past years has been on lay leader formation, and my conversations with colleagues indicate that this topic is relevant not only in Russia, but around the globe. As I have dug deeper into the situation of churches in the developing world, I have seen that they frequently do not have the resources to dedicate staff to this ministry; instead, lay leader training is add to area deans' or assistants' to the bishop long list of responsibilities. In my first months at the mission, it was my theory that – despite enormous differences between countries such as Brazil and India, Ethiopia and Peru – it should be possible to share curriculums and best practices among partners, both cutting down on the effort needed to prepare educational programs and enriching those programs through a cross-cultural element.



At the same time, I realized that this was my theory "on paper," and that, in order to see what really might and might not work, it would be important to develop relationships with local leaders among partner churches. They, I knew, would be able to show me much about their ministry contexts. This would help me understand much better what priorities the churches have and what local factors could either enhance or hinder such cooperative work.

It is with this in mind that I was given the opportunity to travel to southern Africa – Malawi and South Africa – for two weeks at the end of 2022. ELM partners in this region are quite varied, but all of

them are interested in working together with us in the field of theological education. By traveling to the countries, I not only developed important relationships with local leaders and gained new insights into their ministries, I also now have a better understanding of changes I need to make in order to increase the odds that cooperative educational efforts might be successful. In order to gain a still fuller picture, it would be helpful for me to travel to other regions as well; we'll see if the Lord makes that possible. In the meantime, I pray for guidance as we attempt to support the wonderful work Christians throughout the globe are doing to spread Jesus' love and the word of God's grace.

Prayer requests

Please pray for peace, both among nations and within each of us, as we witness the horrors of war. Please pray for my family that all of us continue to adapt to our environments – Natasha, Lukas (9) and I in Hermannsburg; Martin (16) at ballet school in Berlin, and Matvey (18) at Montana State University in the United States.


After Pastor Drew put me on the spot during Sunday announcements and inquired how many families have been seen at our Operation Sandwich stops this summer in Nisswa, Pequot Lakes, Jenkins and Pine River, I thought I would share the numbers through 7/13/23. The simple fact is that numbers are high! Last summer our Northern Route averaged 47 families per week. This year the lowest weekly total has been 85 families, with the highest

total 104. That's a lot of grocery bags to pack and carry and an incredible amount of work done by volunteers and Bridges of Hope. All our stops have seen an increase in families. I believe stuffing our rummage sale bags with Operation Sandwich flyers really helped get the word out! Area schools, churches, community events, food shelves, and media also shared our message well.

July 16—September 3, 2023 The second exhibit of the summer is "A Tribute to the Life and Art of Russell Norberg"

Russ Norberg was a well known Minnesota artist whose art found its way across the United States and other countries. He was represented by several of Minnesota's most noted galleries in addition to regional shows. His paintings are included in many private collections as well as corporate headquarters across the US.

Russ grew up in Minnesota and showed an early talent for drawing and painting. His formal training included a masters degree in studio art from the University of Minnesota, Duluth, plus additional studies in Louisville, Kentucky. After four years as a commercial artist, he was a high school art teacher in Staples for 12 years before becoming a fulltime watercolor artist. The subjects for his paintings came from extensive travels in the US, Canada and Alaska, also Norway and Sweden. But most of his inspiration was from his experiences around the forests, lakes, and farms of Minnesota.

Russ lived from 1933 to 2022. We are appreciative that his wife Gwen and son-in-law Bryan Petersen have made this exhibit possible. Norbergs lived on Clark Lake and had a Nisswa Gallery.

Did You Know?

From the "People for Racial Justice" Group Submitted by Marty Halvorson

When you look at your life what would you say is your most significant accomplishment? For many of us who have had successful jobs we might think of our work as at the top of the list. But what often comes first is that we have given our best at raising children, guiding them as best we could. I know in our family we have had all kinds of advantages with quality day and health care, educational opportunities and advantages with home and church. We never had to worry about whether our children would be taken from us and disappear.

Archeologists in Nebraska, at a remote boarding school, are trying to find the bodies of dozens of children who died there and have been lost for decades. Crews with shovels are searching for unmarked sites where ground-penetrating radar suggested a possible location for the cemetery of the Genoa Indian Industrial School. Genoa was part of a national system of more than 400 Native American boarding schools that attempted to integrate Indigenous people into white culture. This was done by separating children from their families and cutting them off from their heritage.

The school, about 90 miles west of Omaha, opened in 1884 and at its height was home to nearly 600 students from more than 40 tribes across the country. Newspaper clippings, records and a student's letter indicate at least 86 students died at the school, usually due to diseases such as tuberculosis and typhoid. You will not find these statistics recorded in any of our history books.

The raising of our children had it's bumps and problems, but we never had to be concerned in the way Indigenous families had to be.




