# Christmas Symbols & Meanings

- · Star = the star of Bethlehem—and hope for humanity.
- · Fir Tree = stands for everlasting life—its needles point upwards toward heaven.
- · Candles = a mirror of starlight (the star of Bethlehem)
- · Gifts with bows = the gifts the Magi brought to the baby Jesus—the ribbon signifies how we should all be tied together in love and kindness at this time of year.
- Red and Green = red stands for Jesus' blood; green stands for everlasting hope of all mankind.
- · Bells = their ringing announced the birth of Jesus; shepherds used bells to help locate lost sheep.
- Ornaments = their bright colors mirror the Holy Spirit and shining hope. Their orb shape stands for completeness and purity.
- · Lights = Jesus is the light of the world.
- · Candy Canes = the shape is like that of a shepherd's crook. Again, the red in the candy stands for Jesus' blood, with the white indicating Christ's purity.
- · Wreath = never-ending symbol of God's eternal love; generosity, giving and gathering.
- · Holly = immortaility.
- · Christmas Cookies = ordinary dough is transformed into wonderful pieces of art, much like God fashioned each of us into wonderful pieces of art.
- · Evergreens = they maintain their color all year, and green represents new life and strength.
- · Mistletoe = love; it cannot grow without having a tree to attach to.
- · Dove = peace on Earth that comes through Jesus.
- · Poinsettia = the Star of Bethlehem.
- Tinsel = tinsel represents spider webs woven in the Christmas Tree by the Christmas Spider in a Eastern European tale. The spiders danced over the tree because it was so beautiful and when Father Christmas arrived, he transformed the webs into silver and gold so as not to disappoint the woman who had so carefully cleaned her house, sweeping the spiders away.

The crazy holiday season countdown is like a great big package we tear into (earlier and earlier!) every year. It's bright and flashy, but we don't find a whole lot at the heart of it.

And then there's Advent.

Advent is like a small and carefully-wrapped gift that invites us to open it slowly, day-by-day, to discover new treasures inside each year. It's the quiet, magnificent story unfolding beneath all the shopping and celebrating. It's the real journey that will still be beautiful and true when everything else passes away. It is a time of happiness, celebration, and hopeful anticipation of the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. This is the story we should want our children to be swept up in.

They love anticipation and discovery; They love creating and celebrating. Help them pour that God-given energy and excitement into the stuff that truly matters this Advent season. If you have an Advent calendar, include scripture with it to be read each day. Taking a few moments each day to shift focus to Jesus' arrival will make a big difference. Make prayer a part of this moment—brainstorm some people, situations, locations, etc. that you'd like to pray for this Advent. As you check the calendar each day, choose one of your prayer requests and pray together for it/them. On Sundays, light an Advent wreath—it doesn't have to be fancy by any means. As you light the candles, talk about what it might look lie to shine God's light in the coming week. Just don't let Advent become another burdensome thing to check off the holiday to-do list. Make it a fun and meaningful family time of a few moments each day.

Celebrating Advent as its own holiday, a special event all its own, makes the waiting for Christmas to come a little easier. The days pass more quickly. And, best of all, we talk about Jesus all month long. The key to observing Advent isn't doing every possible activity every day. Advent Trivia: The first recorded mention of Advent occurred at a meeting of church leaders in Spain in the 300's A.D. The Council of Saragossa encouraged people to attend church daily between December 17-29.

- In Eastern Orthodox churches, believers participate in a Nativity Fast that begins November 15 and ends December 24. During the fast, they abstain from meat, dairy, fish, wine, and oil.
- In Germany, Christian set four candles in an evergreen Advent wreath. Each Sunday preceding Christmas, they light another candle while singing Christmas songs.
- In China, families put up a "tree of light" and decorate it with lanterns, flowers, and red paper chains. Some give apples on Christmas Eve because the Chinese word for apple sounds similar to the word for peace.
- In the Philippines, people attend nine different early morning masses with the final mass occurring on Christmas Day. They decorate a bamboo pole with a lighted "lantern" that represents the star followed by the wise men.
- In Costa Rica, families decorate their houses with tropical flowers and set up a nativity scene. On Christmas Eve, everyone dresses up and goes to Midnight Mass.

#### ELW 281 Silent Night, Holy Night (STILLE NACHT)

- Silent night, holy night! All is calm, all is bright

Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel (God with us). Isaiah 7:14

It was Christmas Eve in the Austrian Alps. At the newly constructed Church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, a Tyrol village near Salzburg, Father Joseph Mohr prepared for the midnight service. He was distraught because the church organ was broken, ruining prospects for that evening's carefully planned music. But Father Joseph was about to learn that our problems are God's opportunities, that the Lord causes all things to work together for good to those who love Him. It came into Father Joseph's mind to write a new song, one that could be sung without. Hastily, he wrote the words, "Silent Night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright..." Taking the text to his organist, Franz Gruber, he explained the situation and asked Franz to compose a simple tune.

That night, December 24, 1818, "Silent Night" was sung for the first time as a duet accompanied by a guitar at the aptly named Church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf.

Shortly afterward, as Karl Mauracher came to repair the organ, he heard about the near-disaster on Christmas Eve. Acquiring a copy of the text and tune, he spread it throughout the Alpine region of Austria, referring to it as "Tiroler Volkslied" (Tyrolian National Anthem).

The song came to the attention of the Strasser Family, makers of fine chamois-skin gloves. To drum up business at various fairs and festivals, the four Strasser children would sing in front of their parent's booth. Like the Von Trapp children (from Sound of Music) a century later, they became popular folk singers throughout the Alps.

When the children-Caroline, Joseph, Andreas, and Amalie-began singing "Tiroler Volkslied" at their performances, audiences were charmed. It seemed perfect for the snow-clad region, and perfect for the Christian heart. "Silent Night" even came to the attention of the king and queen, and the Strasser children were asked to give a royal performance, assuring the carols' fame.

"Silent Night was first published for congregational singing in 1838 in the German hymnbook, Katholisches Gesang-und Gebetbuch für den öffentlichen und häuslichen Gottesdienst zum Gebracuche der katholischen Gereindem in Königreiche Sachsen. (translated – Catholic Hymn and prayer book for public and domestic worship for the use of Catholic communities in the kingdoms of Saxony) It was used in America by Germanspeaking congregations, then appeared in its current English form in a book of Sunday school songs in 1863.

Were it not for a broken organ, there would never have been a "Silent Night".

#### Did You Know?

From the "People for Racial Justice" Group Submitted by Marty Halvorson

Ojibwe call themselves Anishinaabe which means "True People" or "Original People". In the United states, Chippewa was used in all treaties and remains the official name so if you are confused by the number of names used to describe the same peoples that makes sense. There are 7 primary clans of the Anishinaabe people: loon, crane, fish, bird, bear, marten and deer. Members of the same clan consider themselves close relatives and could not marry within the clan.

God in Ojibwe is Gitche Manitou. Ojibwe religious life was largely personal but was also a daily concern with living appropriately and making one's way through a world filled with spirits. The spirits inhabited birds, animals, rocks and cosmic phenomena including the sun, moon, four winds, thunder, lightning and thunderbirds. Included in the spiritual practices of all tribes is the pipe ceremony. Smoking the pipe, for many First Nations, is rich in symbolism: offering tobacco to the almighty, demonstrating solidarity and power within a tribe or band, signifying honor and sacredness of life, as well as making a commitment, an agreement or treaty.

As we all know, the the war and terror attacks persist in ravaging the Holy Land. Due to this continuing unrest, I feel that it is best that we postpone our trip to Israel until 2025.

Sadly, fighting in this region has been going on for a long time. As we prepare for the season of Advent, let us bear in mind that God sent his Son into the world to bring it peace. Join me today in praying that peace that surpasses all human knowledge may rest upon the people of Israel and the Palestinian people.

May we focus our prayers on resolution of conflict and ask God to bring peace.












#### **NOVEL IDEAS BOOK CLUB**

Summary of Stewardship Breakfast held on Oct 15, 2023

Based upon a plate count at the front of the serving line, we served 160 people. This years count was slightly down from last years count. One possible reason was the 15th of Oct was the start of MEA week. The following food quantities were pitched from Shane Moore at Sysco foods.

30 lbs of pancake mix (6-5 lbs bags)

8.81 lbs butter (individual packets)

30 lbs liquids eggs

400 individual precooked sausage links

1 box orange juice (12- 46 oz )

Almost all the pancake mix was used, there was a small quantity left over. All the sausage links and eggs were served, we had plenty of butter left over and there was one container of OJ left.

I heard a couple of comments regarding tough pancakes. We began cooking the pancakes about an hour prior to serving time and placed them into the oven to keep warm. The pancakes cooked first were served first, so they may have been in the oven for an hour and dried out. Next year we will wait to cook the pancakes. That was the only comment that I heard.

I would also like to thank Rob Norgon for taking the time to brief me on organizing the breakfast and providing notes from previous events.

I'm open to any other comments / suggestions to improve the process.

- Fundraising for the ramp project is complete. Last week the new handicap accessible doors were
  installed at the north entrance. Removing the existing concrete steps and constructing a heated ramp
  with new railings will be completed early next year. The keypad access has been relocated to the
