It gives me great pleasure to announce that Lutheran Church of the Cross continues to move forward, as we transition back to in-person worship in Celebration Center or January 31st, 2021. At our January meeting, our Church Council (along with the recommendations from the LCC Smart Team and staff) approved the move to Phase 3 of our reopening plan. Therefore, the following guidelines will be implemented:

- Anyone entering our facility must sign in (non-members will need to provide contact information) and everyone must wear a mask or face shield.
- Drinking fountains will not be available, with the exception of the touchless dispenser near Chapel Hall (bring your own bottle.)
- Restrooms use will be limited to those in SE corner of the building, near the Choir Room and Celebration Center.
- Our Nursery will remain closed until further notice.

<u>Sunday Worship</u> will consist of one service at 9am that will be broadcast live from the Celebration Center. This location will allow for social distancing, take advantage of greater air circulation, and help increase efficiency of sanitizing. Wearing masks will be required, and should you not have one, we have various types available here. Our worship service will be shortened, as there will be no call or response, and singing by the congregation will be limited. Bulletins and any other worship materials will be distributed in hard copy form for one-time individual use.

As the conclusion of the worship services, ushers will direct worshippers to leave the building in an expedient manner; we will not be hosting any fellowship time in the facility. For those wishing to, we suggest visiting in the parking lot (following social distancing and masking guidelines.)

In addition to holding Sunday services in Celebration Center, we will be once again implementing a special Cross Kids Worship Service for children ages Kindergarten through Grade 6 in the Sanctuary. This service will run concurrently with the 9am service in Celebration Center and will replace Sunday School for the time being. This service will be led by our Director of Children and Family Ministry, Kari Erikson and will include the use of video projected onto a large screen for participants to follow. Masking and social distancing will be observed.

Wednesday evenings: in-person worship will be held in the Celebration center at 6:20pm and will be broadcast online. Immediately following worship, programing for grades 5-12 will take place with all meetings wrapping up by 7:30pm. A hybrid model is available for those not wishing to not be in person.

Ash Wednesday: We will offer three opportunities for people to gather and receive ashes. Drive thru imposition of Ashes will be held from 12 noon to 1pm and 7 to 8pm in our front parking lot. Individual cups of ashes will be distributed and a brief prayer offered as you will self-impose the ash cross on your forehead. In-person worship service will be held in Celebration Center at 6:20pm with cups of ashes available for self-imposition during worship (this service will be streamed online, as well.)

This has been a challenging time in our lives and in the life of the church. No one could have imagined that we would be open this past fall and then have to go back to online and parking lot worship; but we are a resilient church. We have risen to the challenges and we have grown stronger for it.

Thank you for your continued prayers and support and we move through this pandemic time together. We will get through this. God is watching over us and giving us strength. And as we continue to move forward may we look upward, travel onward, and not be afraid.

Children's Call to Prayer

Let's be as still as stones. and as silent as the stars as we listen for the voice of God whispering in our hearts.





Dear friends, we should love each other, because love comes from God. Everyone who loves has become God's child. And so everyone who loves knows God. - 1 John 4:7

Lord, Show us today the overlooked ways that we do not love others fully. The times that we ignore, or pass by, or give no attention. The moments that we have not let Your love invade. The times that are too busy to show Your love inside of us. Forgive us for cutting short what Your love would do. By Your power, help us to change habits this Lenten season in small ways. Help us become aware of any bias or busyness or selfishness. Help my children and me to display that we have been filled with the Holy Spirit by our generous and patient love. In Jesus' name, Amen.



Thirty Seconds of Silence

Monks practice silence in order to better hear God. Your family can this Lent, too, by turning off radios and music players (maybe just in the car), turning off the television, eating a meal in silence, practicing Thirty Seconds of Silence, being silent for the first fifteen minutes of the morning, or even trying a day of silence.

Prepare for mealtime prayers or family prayer with thirty seconds of silence, a practice that helps everyone (including parents) settle down and refocus their attention. It also helps children learn to be silent and still, which is good preparation for other prayer practices, such as meditative or contemplative prayer. Here's what to do:

- Explain that you will be spending time in silent prayer. You might encourage younger children to listen
 for the presence of God, or for what Jesus is whispering in their hearts.
- Light a prayer candle as a way of signaling that this is a special time, and as a sign of God's presence.
- Start with thirty seconds and gradually lengthen the time.
- Model prayerful silence by spending the time actually opening yourself to the presence of God. As much
 as possible, ignore children's fidgeting and giggling (at least during the time of silence). With enough
 practice, even young children will begin to imitate your example.

Once you've mastered the practice of thirty seconds of silence at the beginning of your prayer time, try it at the end of your prayer time, too.

Celebrate Lent and make it a meaningful experience

Celebrating Lent is about being intentional; about adding good things to our lives and about serving others. Here's some suggestions of things older kids and youth/tweens can do during the 40 days of Lent:

- Limit personal social media time
- Call someone instead of texting them
- Sub junky snacks with healthy ones
- Give uplifting comments instead of snarky or sarcastic ones
- Try to stick to a sleeping schedule
- · Make your bed each morning
- Read the Bible each day. Try reading the Gospel of Mark over the 40 days
- Set aside time each day for prayer.
- Host family night—help choose a meal or snacks and a board game one evening a week.
- Do your siblings' chores once a week for them without being asked.
- Write a thank you note to one of your teachers or your pastor
- Help a neighbor with snow removal
- Bake cookies for a church member and deliver them with a nice note
- Ask a parent or caregiver to share a story from their childhood with you

Music Notes

February 2021 Hymn of the Month

Brightest and Best of the Stars (STAR OF THE EAST)

Oh, Wondrous Image, Vision Fair(DEO GRACIAS) Hymn 316

This month's hymn of the month is "Oh, Wondrous Image, Vision Fair". The music is an old English melody from the 15th Century. The text was from *Sarum*, the 15th Century Missal or liturgy. It was translated from Latin by John Mason Neale.



Traditionally we sing this on Transfiguration Sunday, which will be February 14 this year. Transfiguration is when Jesus took Peter, James and John up a mountain and his appearance changed to radiant glory. His clothing became dazzling white. Appearing also was Elijah and Moses. A voice spoke to them from the clouds and said "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!"

Transfiguration marks also the last Sunday before the Lent season begins.

- 1. Oh, wondrous image, vision fair of glory that the church may share, Which Christ upon the mountain shows, where brighter than the sun he glows!
- 2. With Moses and Elijah nigh the incarnate Lord holds converse high, And from the cloud, the Holy One says, "This is my beloved Son".
- 3. With shining face and bright array, Christ deigns to manifest today What glory shall be theirs above who joy in God with perfect love.
- 4. And faithful hearts are raised on high by this great vision's mystery; For which in joyful song we raise the voice of prayer, the hymn of praise.
- 5. O Father, with the eternal Son, and Holy Spirit ever one,
 We pray you, bring us by your grace to see your glory face to face.

DEO GRACIAS (also known as the AGINCOURT HYMN) is the tune of this hymn and was also from the 15th Century. It was used to celebrate King Henry V's victory at the Battle of Agincourt in 1415. It is written in the Dorian mode, which sounds very minor.


This is a triumphant hymn. You will hear it Sunday, February 14 when we celebrate the Transfiguration of Christ.

Mardi Gras or Shrove Tuesday, is on February 16, 2021. This day is also known as "FAT or PANCAKE TUESDAY," a day to feast and celebrate before the 40 days of Lent. However, there's more to life than feasting and celebrating. Think about how you can fill your barn with God instead of self!

The word shrove refers to asking for absolution from your sins. Years ago it was typical to prepare for Lent by asking for forgiveness in order to have a clean spirit in preparation for Lent and Easter.


Lent is a time of fasting and spiritual growth, mimicking the time Jesus spent in the wilderness— Matthew 4:1-11. Many thing of Lent as "wilderness time," a time for contemplation and rediscovering your focus. For Jesus, it was His moment of readiness for His ministry. And like Jesus, we all need some reflection time to focus on our faith.

So—why pancakes? The pancakes themselves are made with ingredients and served with foods that people traditionally gave up for Lent. In the early Roman Catholic church, Lent was a time to fast and limit fatty foods—therefore, households would use up all of those foods the day before Ash Wednesday. Some churches would ring their bells to signal time for confession and time to start making pancakes!

As for the celebrating, it's a reminder of our community of faith, the people who stick by us in good times and tough times—rejoicing that Jesus forgives us from our past mistakes and justifies us before God. -a little celebration before a period of contemplation.

For us, forgiveness is always available in good times and bad. We are "shriven" by the Lord of the Dance—Jesus! Check out this You Tube video—https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zDdQhsjNHcw

Jesus himself loved to feast and have fun with other people. When we gather, He is in our midst. So make some pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and ask Jesus to walk with you on your Lenten journey.

A Message from our ELCA Global Missionary

Russian Correspondent

Watchword for 2021



The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Russia in which I serve highly values the practice of reading Bible verses chosen for each day, month and year. The "losung" for the upcoming year is Luke 6:36 - "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful."

Looking ahead to 2021, it is clear that we will need all the mercy we can get. Here in Russia our experiences in 2020 have taught us to recognize in a new way the depth of our

own vulnerability and the seriousness of our responsibility to care for one another. At the same time, your brothers and sisters in Christ in this part of the globe have been reminded that "your Father is merciful" in a multitude of ways -including through your partnership! In response they are striving to radiate mercy through the ministries of their congregations and in their daily lives. Thank you for all the ways you support the mission of the church - through your prayers, through your offerings, through your personal connections. We look forward to restoring the best of what has been and to opening up new ways of interaction in 2021.

Prayer requests

I am sure that many of you who are reading this have run into very serious challenges in many aspects of life over these many months of the pandemic. Having myself come down with the coronavirus (in a light form, thankfully) in May, for most of the year the main difficulties we faced on a personal level were related to keeping one another safe while at the same time trying to do the best we could for our children's education and development. Things took a turn for the more difficult, however, after the summer. My father-in-law, Alexander, who was diagnosed with late stage prostate cancer in late spring, had difficulties receiving proper medical attention; both COVID and corruption played a role. By the fall we were able to bring him to Moscow for treatment, but by then many of his internal bodily processes were failing, and he needed all of us - my wife (Natasha), my mother-in-law (Alla), and I - to help him physically, while I tried to support them spiritually as well. In the last days of December, Alexander became infected with COVID after his doctor came down with the virus; Natasha, in turn, was also infected when helping out her father at the hospital. Alexander was transferred to a unit where we were no longer able to offer our help... and where he passed away on the morning of January 1. Natasha is isolating at home; no one else in the family seems to be infected. At the same time because these are the holidays here and because of the COVID diagnosis, everything related to the funeral is delayed and uncertain. has served as a pastor and church redeveloper in Wisconsin, as well as assistant to the bishop and director for evangelical mission in the NWWI synod, and most recently served as assistant to the bishop (Tom Aitkin) and director for evangelical mission in the NEMN synod from 2016 to 2020. Most notable for us is that Bishop Amy (then Assistant to the Bishop) installed our very own Pastor Bakken here at Lutheran Church of the Cross!

CREATION CARE

An Organization working on Climate Solutions Lutheran Church of the Cross has shown concern for God's creation. We are aware that climate change is threatening our earthly home. We have done what we can here in Nisswa with solar panels, looked for ways to use energy efficiently, developed an active Creation Care Team and a wonderful organic garden space. Many of us are doing what we can as individuals to keep our air and water clean and reduce waste. In order to get policies that reduce pollution and reduce the effects of a changing climate we will need to work with legislators.



I am a member of an organization called Citizen's Climate Lobby (CCL). CCL is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that empowers people to work together on climate change solutions. Supporters are organized in more than 600 local chapters across the United States. There are currently 25 chapters in Minnesota and one of them is in St. Cloud. The organization models behavior we need in our country such as mutual respect, healthy dialogue and faith in the processes and institutions of democracy. In the years before COVID, members went twice a year to Washington, D.C. to talk to their representatives and senators to develop political will to enact policies that will deal with climate change. This year they have had to switch to online conversations. I have attended online conferences that are very informative and encouraging. CCL also has action teams, one of which is the Faith Action Team. That team currently has 10 religious groups including Episcopal, Jewish, Evangelical Christian and the United Methodist Church. The Lutheran Church does not yet have an action team. I liked the purpose that was stated by the Evangelical Christian team. Their purpose is to "motivate fellow Evangelicals to learn about and act to address the bibical, moral and justice challenges posed by climate change." You can learn more about this organization by going on their website citizensclimatelobby.org. We hope to soon have the Lutheran Church be part of the Faith Action Team.
