EPIPHANY—HOLY GRAFFITI!

24 + C + M + B + 24

If you're not familiar with this holy day, Epiphany takes place on January 6. It provides the occasion to celebrate the revelation of

God to all peoples in Jesus of Nazareth.

Epiphany (also known as Twelfth Night, *Theophany*, or Three Kings Day) marks the occasion of a time-honored Christian tradition of "chalking the doors." The formula for the ritual — adapted for 2020 — is simple: take chalk of any color and write the following above the entrance of your home:

24 + C + M + B + 24

The letters have two meanings. First, they represent the initials of the Magi — Caspar, Malchior, and Balthazar — who came to visit Jesus in His first home. They also abbreviate the Latin phrase, *Christus mansionem benedicat*: "May Christ bless this dwelling." The "+" signs represent the cross, and the "24" at the beginning and the "24" at the end mark the year. Taken together, this inscription is performed as a request for Christ to bless those homes so marked and that He stay with those who dwell therein throughout the entire year.

The chalking of the doors is a centuries-old practice throughout the world, though it appears to be somewhat less well-known in the United States. It is, however, an easy tradition to adopt, and a great practice whereby we dedicate our year to God from its very outset, asking His blessing on our homes and on all who live, work, or visit them there.

When we "Chalk the Door," we mark our front or main entrance doors with chalk as a sign that we are inviting God's presence into the places, relationships, and situations that we call home. Chalking the door is a tangible way to honor God in our lives.

Read Deuteronomy 6:4-9: Listen, people of Israel! The LORD is our God. The LORD is the only God. You must love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength. Always remember these commands that I give you today. Be sure to teach them to your children. Talk about these commands when you sit in your house and when you walk on the road. Talk about them when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them on your hands and wear them on your foreheads to help you remember my teachings. Write them on the doorposts of your houses and on your gates.

Practicing traditions like the chalking of the doors helps us to live our Faith more concretely and serve as an outward sign of our dedication to Our Lord. Our homes are also the place where many of us will make the greatest strides in our spiritual growth,

through observance of daily prayer, spiritual reading, and work offered as an oblation to God.

The chalking of the doors of a home encourages Christians to dedicate their life at home to God and to others. Seeing the symbols over our doors can help to remind us, while passing in and out on our daily routines, that our homes and all those who dwell there belong to Christ. It also serves as a reminder of welcoming the Magi gave to Jesus. We should strive to be as welcoming to all who come to our homes to visit us!

How to Do Chalking the Doors

- 1. Mark your calendar Epiphany is on January 6, 12 days after Christmas.
- 2. Find some chalk Any color will do! Sidewalk chalk is a particularly sturdy option.
- 3. Gather everyone together Everyone should be involved. If you're blessing your home, gather your whole household.
- 4. **Pray** God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten One to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this home and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Savior. Amen.

All may take turns chalking the door: 24+C+M+B+24

5. **Pray**—The three Wise Men, Caspar [C], Melchior [M], and Balthasar [B], followed the star to Bethlehem and the child Jesus 2000 [20] and 24 [24] years ago. May Christ bless our home, and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

2024 will arrive soon, and New Year's Day gives us a chance to celebrate the old year and look ahead to the new one. And a new year provides an opportunity for us all to make a difference. For our children and youth, it means we need to encourage them and pray for them to get through any barriers they run into and help them work toward becoming the person Christ wants them to be. We need to help them see what amazing things God has in store for them in the coming year.

In today's world, kids/teens sometimes run from one

thing to another in a quest to keep up with their peers. As mentors, parents, aunts, uncles, and grandparents, it is our role to help them to remember that they are created for good works despite what may be going on around them. When Paul spoke to the Ephesians, he reminded them of how they should live (see Ephesians 4:17-24.) You see, we have to keep in mind – everyday – how God plays a role in each moment for us as Christians. Sometimes that means 'putting on a new self' (see Ephesians 4:22-25.) Maybe a good habit for 2024 would be to recite Psalm 51:10 each morning: *God, create a pure heart in me, and make my spirit strong again*. When a child/teen in your life is struggling, remind them of Psalm 51:10. Remind them over and over.

Whatever happens, always be thankful. This is how God wants you to live in Christ Jesus. 1 Thessalonians 5:18. Hmmmm – don't just be thankful for the good stuff, but for all stuff. Reflecting on what we are grateful for is the key to finding things to be thankful for in any circumstance. 1 Peter 1:6-7 encourages us with these words: I know the thought of that is exciting, even if you must suffer through different kinds of troubles for a short time now. These troubles test your faith and prove that it is pure. And such faith is worth more than gold. Gold can be proved to be pure by fire, but gold will ruin. When your faith is proven to be pure, the result will be praise and glory and honor when Jesus Christ comes. Another key message we must relay to our children and youth is that the more we celebrate God throughout our day, the more His joy will fill our hearts. And, the more we learn about Jesus, the more we become like Him. Learning about Him requires questions and discussion, along with hearing the gospel and reading it.

I'm not convinced that God is very interested in new year resolutions we can make about changing things. He wants us each to live for Him and through that life, make a difference. Will you join me in being the face of Jesus for our children and youth? Keep being there for them and live in a way that sets and example for them to follow. Encourage them when they stumble and help grow their faith. Together we can do this and WE WILL MAKE A DIFFERENCE!








Playground Update

January 2024 Hymn of the Month

ELW 295 Of The Father's Love Begotten (DIVINUM MYSTERIUM)

- Of the Father's love begotten ere the worlds began to be,
 He is Alpha and Omega, he the source, the ending he,
 Of the things that are, that have been, and that future years shall see,
 Evermore and evermore.
- Oh, that birth forever blessed, when the virgin, full of grace, By the Holy Ghost conceiving, bore the Savior of our race, And the babe, the world's redeemer, first revealed his sacred face, Evermore and evermore.
- This is he whom seers in old time chanted of with one accord, Whom the voices of the prophets promised in their faithful word; Now he shines, the long expected; let creation praise its Lord Evermore and evermore.
- 4. Let the heights of heaven adore him; angel hosts, his praises sing; Powers, dominions, bow before him and extol our God and king; Let no tongue on earth be silent, every voice in concert ring Evermore and evermore.
- 5. Christ, to thee, with God the Father, and, O Holy Ghost, to thee, Hymn and chant and high thanksgiving and unwearied praises be; Honor, glory, and dominion, and eternal victory Evermore and evermore!

This hymn is one of my very favorite (among many!) with it beautiful haunting, plainsong chant melody, which originated as early as the 10th century. The text matches the music perfectly telling the story of our salvation from the beginning of creation.

This is the story of how this hymn came to be, written by Robert J. Morgan in his book *Then Sings My Soul, Book 3.*

This ancient Latin hymn is by Aurelius Prudentius, who was born in northern Spain in AD 348, not long after Christianity was legalized in the Roman Empire following three centuries of persecution. Prudentius became a lawyer and provincial governor in Spain where his leadership skills attracted the attention of Emperor Theodosius I who appointed him to an imperial military post.

It may have been shortly afterward that Prudentius gave his life to Christ and began writing Christian poetry. At age fifty-seven, he retired from government and entered a monastery where he devoted himself to worship and writing. Today we have nearly four hundred poems from his hand.

Prudentius has been called "the prince of early Christian poets." Though he and Ambrose were both writing hymns about the same time, the one by Prudentius are more reflective, displaying greater warmth and glow. Perhaps it was his warm Spanish blood.

"Of the Father's Love Begotten" is among the greatest Christmas carols in Western history, and thankfully its popularity is on the increase, partly owing to the tender beauty of its probing score, *Divinum Mysterium*, composed nearly a thousand years ago.

Incidentally, the poetry of Prudentius was influenced by other Christian authors such as Tertullian, St. Ambrose and of course the Bible. Currently, "Of the Father's Love Begotten" is the most well-known. We will sing this hymn throughout January as it tells our salvation story, starting with the beginning, the Alpha, then Jesus' miraculous birth, the words of the seers and prophets, angels praising and worshipping God the Most High, and honor to the Triune God.

On Monday the 4th of December the committee "People for Racial Justice" met with Charles Blacklance who is a Native American member of our community. The meeting, chaired by Terry Frovik, was an open forum for conversation in which Charles could entertain questions in which our committee found interest. The level of intimate sharing was incredible. Charles shared that from his perspective, things may not have changed as much as people would think as concerned with minority acceptance in the community. His examples of being singled out by several citizens left me to ponder what could be done by each of us to make our community more inclusive. Charles, as the director of TRIA at the Community College, has had an impact on that community through his very presence. It seems more likely that those who don't know him are more likely to treat him and his family harshly.

Story telling is a method of conversation that is a way of sharing important concerns. Charles helped us consider faith, inclusion and love for our fellow human beings through his story telling. One story he shared involved a faith community and how important it is for him (and all of us) to be supported by and be able to contribute to that community. We at Lutheran Church of the Cross know how important that is. I felt challenged to make sure that those who are new members or visitors experience a welcoming community.




NOVEL IDEAS BOOK CLUB

CREATION CARE

The Problem With Bottled Water

Americans drink around **15 billion gallons of bottled water** each year - around 45 gallons per person, according to the International Bottled Water Association. While bottled water may be necessary short-term while traveling, or if tap water is contaminated, it is not a good long-term solution.

According to Consumer Reports, some bottled waters are simply tap water, and have tested positive for heavy metals, PFAS, and other contaminants. Since bottled water is typically packaged in plastic, things such as antimony, bisphenols, phthalates, and microplastics can leach into the water. The manufacturing and disposing of the bottles are a major source of the many chemicals that end up in our drinking water. SOME TIPS WHEN YOU NEED WATER ON THE GO: 1) because microscopic damage can shed microplastics, don't reuse single-use bottles - they break down more quickly than sturdier plastics, according to research at the University of South Carolina; 2) since high heat can damage plastic and lead to chemicals leaching into water, especially when exposed for extended periods, don't store water bottles in vehicles, and never let the water bottles get too hot; 3) look for labels on water bottles that indicate the water has undergone filtration before being bottled; 4) when you need water on the go, try filling up a reusable glass or stainless steel water bottle with tap water.

If you have concerns about your municipal drinking water or well water, there are local businesses that can test it for you. You can also try several mail-in kits that Consumer Reports has tested: 1) Simplelab Tapscore (mytapscore.com); 2) National Testing Laboratories (watercheck.com) - tests for PFAS, lead, etc. or call 800-458-3330; 3) Cyclopure (cyclopure.com) - which tests for PFAS. Each differs in cost and what they test for.
