### May 2021 Hymn of the Month

### Hymn 396 Spirit of Gentleness (SPIRIT), written by James K. Manley

On May 23, we will celebrate Pentecost. It is actually the birth of the early church. The Holy Spirit descends upon the disciples and many other followers of the risen Jesus Christ with tongues of fire. The people were amazed and asked the disciples what this all meant. The Peter then instructed them all to repent and be baptized, they would then receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The Lord increased the number of saved and hence the early church was born and grew.

This hymn, Spirit of Gentleness, describes the Spirit as gentle, but restless as well, doing restless things – blows, stirs, calls, frees, moves, coaxes, creates, awakens, sweeps, stings, goads, speaks, sings, cries, whispers, and breaks all forms of bondage. A very *active* Spirit in our lives. A Spirit who encourages us to be active in our faith and spread the good news.

### Spirit of Gentleness

#### Refrain

Spirit, Spirit of gentleness, blow through the wilderness calling and free; Spirit, Spirit of restlessness, stir me from placidness, wind, wind on the sea.

- You moved on the waters, you called to the deep, then you coaxed up the mountains from the valleys of sleep; and over the eons you called to each thing: "Awake from your slumbers and rise on your wings."
- You swept through the desert, you stung with the sand, and you goaded your people with a law and a land; and when they were blinded with idols and lies, then you spoke through your prophets to open their eyes.
- You sang in a stable, you cried from a hill, then you whispered in silence when the whole world was still; and down in the city you called once again, when you blew through your people on the rush of the wind.
- You call from tomorrow, you break ancient schemes.
   From the bondage of sorrow all the captives dream dreams; our women see visions, our men clear their eyes.
   With bold new decisions your people arise.

James Manley wrote this hymn in 1975 when he was a student at Clarmont School of Theology. He wrote the tune and it was first used at a church in Honolulu when he was a chaplain and teacher at the Mid-State Institute in that city. He also served as a Pastor in Northern California.

We will be singing this hymn on Pentecost Sunday and more throughout the season. Use this text as a prayer of thankfulness to our loving God the Father, His Son and the Holy Spirit as we go through the Pentecost Season.



### **Sharing Bread Soup Kitchen News**

Exciting things are happening at the Sharing Bread Soup Kitchen. Since Covid hit we have been acting as a food shelf handing out weekly bags of food every Wednesday, and then adding on a Saturday of two takeout meals. During that time the soup kitchen has handed out more than 155,000 pounds of food.



We have a new walk-in refrigerator/freezer that we share with a coalition of food shelfs in the lakes area to recue food that would have gone to waste.

Now that Spring is finally here, we are going back to our original groups of volunteers and serving daily to go meals starting April 14th.

Lutheran Church of the Cross will serve the first Thursday of every month. May 6th will be LCC's first date and the Klangs and Krafts have volunteered. Please let Ann Bergin know if your group would like to make and serve a takeout meal on any of these dates. June 3rd, July 1st, August 5th, September 2nd, October 7th, November 4th, or December 2nd. This gets us to the end of the year. Ann will explain how it works and even be there for support if needed. 218-820-5511 call or text me.

**Thank you to Michelle Ruen,** a second-year seminary student in the TEEM Program (Theological Education in Emerging Ministries) at Wartburg Seminary located in Dubuque, lowa shared the "Proof is in the Pudding" message on April 11th at LCC. Michelle was an elementary school teacher in the Brainerd School District for 29 years. She grew up in Decorah, lowa where she enjoyed picnic lunches under the Martin Luther statue on the campus of Luther College. Michelle's mentor pastor while attending seminary and exploring ministry is LCC's Pastor Drew Bakken.

### The Word Present and Future

Despite the challenges and risks we were able to organize a few, important in-person meetings over the past few months. This includes two trips to the Russian Far East and another to the church center in Omsk.

#### Vladivostok/ Ussuriysk, August and September

While we unable to gather our people together for our annual deanery-wide seminar for adults and youth, in late summer, it was safe enough for me to travel that I did go to the Far East. While I limited to Vladivostok and its surroundings, this fit well with my first priority – being with the St. Paul Lutheran in Vladivostok as it is undergoing a transition in pastoral leadership. Thanks to a good group of lay leaders assisted by retired pastor Manfred Brockmann and occasionally by their nearest "neighbor" (Pastor Alexander Lapochenko, a 5 hour bus-ride away), the congregation has made it through the difficult period of vacancy. Now, starting literally today (January 6), their new pastor has arrived. I will write more about Pastor Vitaly Mohr in upcoming newsletters, but for now I will say that Vitaly grew up in Siberia, immigrated with his family to Germany as a teenager, and, having completed his theological education there, returned to serve in the Russian Lutheran Church. For the past few years he has been pastor in Tomsk and several other cities in eastern Siberia. We had hoped to celebrate his installation in Vladivostok this coming Sunday, but personal circumstances (again, see prayer requests below) have made


me delay my trip. This change in plans, however, will not affect the enthusiasm with which he will be welcomed by the members of the congregation.

### Synod Assembly / Seminar


In the late summer the leadership of the ELCUSFE (...Urals, Siberia and Far East) decided that they would work to minimize health risks, but would, all the same, host an in-person synod assembly in the fall. Delegates from high risk populations were asked to send their alternates instead, while other safety measures were taken for those who would attend. It must be acknowledged that there was a tendency at that time not to take the threat of COVID seriously enough; the first wave had not hit Siberia very hard, and many had the sense that being less-densely populated did wonders to slow down the spread of the disease. As we were to learn, we were not cautious enough. There were a number of positive cases that can be connected directly to the synod assembly and seminar; thankfully, however, none of the participants or their loved ones was fatally infected by the virus.



#### Pastors' Reports Pastor Drew:

The month of March was a busy month here at Lutheran Church of the Cross. A special thank you to our staff and all the volunteers who helped to make Lent and Holy Week worship possible this year. Once again Easter was different and yet the same. The Easter flowers, decorations and music were beautiful this year. It was fantastic to hear the Pipe Organ ring out with "Jesus Christ is Risen Today", and we had great attendance at all three of our worship services.

On March 27, we had our council retreat in which we got a chance to know one another, review our assigned ministry roles, and to look at the future of LCC. I really appreciated everyone's openness and willing to share. As we move out of this time of COVID, we need to start looking at where God is calling us and how to grow in our faith and membership. This meeting was just the start as we look towards the future. I hope that we can try to make this a quarterly event so that we do not lose momentum.

Some of the items we discussed:

- how to safely move worship back into the sanctuary and the need to update the camera and sound system so that we can continue to provide our online worship presence
- the need to update our constitution
- work on strengthening our ministry teams

• summer worship times such as 9am indoors and online worship and 10:15 outdoor worship with a donut fellowship

This was just the start of our discussions, but I am excited to see where this will lead us.

Our Lenten Devotional this year was from the book "A Story to Tell" and we had averaged over 20 people both in-person and online. We had some great discussions as we made our way through the book of Mark. I look forward to next year's Lenten discussion.

Toward the end of April, we will finish up our staff reviews, and prepare for spring and summer activities.

### Committee Reports: Property: Dale Peterson

- Sound Room: An estimate was received to remodel the sanctuary sound room. Following the estimate, the sound equipment company recommended expanding the opening to the sound room to improve visual and audio access to the sanctuary. A second consult with the construction company followed and it is possible to expand the opening into the sanctuary to 7 feet if we relocate the door to the sound room. They produced a sketch of the proposed changes. With council approval to move forward, they will revise the cost estimate and the council can make a decision next month to move forward with the project. With an approval decision in May this project can be completed this summer. This remodel is in conjunction with the installation of new sound equipment.
- Butterfly Garden: The committee met with the Soil and Water Conservation District staff at LCC on March 24th. They were pleased with the planned location for the Butterfly Garden in the main lawn area in the southeast section of the parking lot, in from the bike path and east of the monument sign. The Green Corps is scheduled to be on site May 13th to take up the grass, put the biodegradable weed suppressant down, and lay the block out in the design formatted in the design layout. I will coordinate moving the landscape blocks back to this area by May 13th. Selection of appropriate plantings is also underway.
- Landscaping: Planned for spring. Plans need to get underway. Repairing/reinstalling the underground irrigation is also part of the landscape project.
- Sanctuary Flooring: An estimate has been requested to replace the sanctuary floor. It will be presented at the May council meeting. If approved, this project could also be completed this summer since the sanctuary is not being used at this time.
- Signage: I recommend installing signage on the north exit road indicating this is an LCC exit/ entrance and not for through traffic. I spoke with the Crossroads Board about Crossroads residents using the road as a through road to County 13 and Highway 371. They again reminded residents to use Smiley Road unless going the church. Really the bigger problem is the delivery and utility trucks that use the road. The Board agree that since the road is owned by the church, any signage would be up to the church.
- Exterior Painting: Painting the exterior of the church is a budgeted and approved project for 2021. However due to scheduling conflicts, it will be completed in 2022.
- Additional future property concerns include security cameras, automatic entry doors, and possible relocation of the church office.

- The organ pipes in the sanctuary were repaired, tuned, and re-voiced in March. Cathy is very excited to have every pipe working again and the organ correctly balanced.
- It was very exciting to have the organ used for Easter Sunday!
- A special thanks to: Sally and Lenny Hodgson, Maureen and Dick Schmidt, Clint Baker, Darrell Paske, and Carol Smith for decorating the Celebration Center with a wonderful array of colorful flowers for Easter Sunday worship.
- Thanks to Liz Brandanger for decorating the flower pots in front of the church for Easter Sunday morning.
- Jerry Raedeke is working on getting the banners for the front entrance of the church ready for Rally Sunday, 2021.
- We are blessed to have so many talented singers and instrumentalists willing to lead in worship on Wednesdays and Sundays. Thank you, Cathy Taylor, for contacting, picking the music, and rehearsing these musicians. Your effort makes our worship services interesting and meaningful.

### Social Concerns and Global Missions: Bonnie Stevens

• Habitat Project: LCC has been asked to partner in a Thrivent Faith Build through Habitat for Humanity in Brainerd. The house will be built in SE Brainerd for the Svoboda family of eight, with six children, currently living in a two bedroom apartment.

To become a Faith partner we commit to:

1. Pray for this project.

2. Communicate with church and other faith communities to make a life-changing impact for this family through home ownership.

- 3. Work with Habitat to plan volunteer days and recruit volunteers. (10 person per day limit)
- 4. Commit to fundraising efforts through the Faith Builds Generosity Challenge.

Thrivent has committed \$62,500 or half the cost of the project. There are currently 8 churches participating in the Faith Build project. Permits have been granted and construction will begin as soon as road restrictions are lifted.

• Operation Sandwich

The Operation Sandwich Team (with Zach's direction) has developed a job description for the Northern Route Director's position which will be funded by Bridges of Hope. This person will work from LCC approximately 15 hours per week.

The Food Drive for the Northern Lakes Route will take place ONLY during May. The goal is to have 5 drop-off locations, one of which will be LCC.

Food items requested will be peanut butter, jelly, fruit snacks and granola snacks.

The team is developing a volunteer model to include new volunteers while keeping the core base groups which have worked well. The focus will be educating more volunteers about food scarcity in our area.

Northern Route Operation Sandwich begins the week of June 7 and ends the week of August 30.

### Motion by Pastor Drew and Second by Colleen Both that LCC partner in a Thrivent Faith Build through Habitat for Humanity in the Brainerd Lakes Area. Motion Passed.

### Children and Family Ministry: Pam Johnson

- Kari got the April Sunday School packets out as well as the Pequot Lakes Religious Release packets delivered.
- Kari mailed out a Holy Week devotional for grades 5-12 that included The Way to the Cross, a finger labyrinth and a Palm Sunday devotion.
- Kari created a Holy Week outdoor scavenger hunt bulletin insert.
- First Communion Workshop and service on Maundy Thursday went really well. We were so very proud of our kids. We used the new Erlander materials and Kari made up take-home bread baking and banner making kits. Ten kids completed the workshop and attended Maundy Thursday worship.
- On Good Friday we added the element of physical objects presented to the congregation during the readings. Jace and Jude Anderson, Rebecca Bakken, and Dane and Emily Smith helped with this.
- Easter crosses were put up and outside for Easter Morning.
