Children are mentioned all throughout the bible. In fact, there are many instances of instructions, promises and encouragements specifically to children. While Jesus walked the earth, worship was a



family affair and all ages were welcome. In fact, Jesus welcomed children *wholeheartedly*, and used them as an example of how to belong to God's kingdom.

Worshipping with children is one of the most important things we can do for them, embracing them *wholeheartedly,* as Jesus did. By including children in worship, we help them to learn to participate in the body of Christ. God has promised to meet with us when we gather for worship - why in the world would we deny children the opportunity to meet - to see, touch, and feel God?

Children are like sponges, and need help, guidance and encouragement to learn the prayers and creeds; to follow along with liturgy and hymns; to pray and to listen to scripture; to give offering; and to receive and give grace. It may seem like simply a routine that they are repeating, but *children will sense our heart for worship long before they understand the words*. They will see and hear firsthand how praising God is one of the most joyous things they will experience in the world! Worshipping with the congregation, children get to sense the awesome wonder of God alongside their church family.

The thing is, children are squirmy, and sometimes noisy – they lack maturity and can be easily distracted. Yes, it is due to their age, but you know what? Saint Augustine of Hippo proposed an idea many years ago... *human beings feel an innate urge to seek out the divine and are restless until they find peace and rest in God.* And while on this seeking journey, humans of all ages need encouragement and guidance, mentoring and love. To that end, we at LCC provide many ways to help children and their parents feel welcomed and loved. After all, as children grow, so does their capacity to understand and express language, as does their ability to sit still for a longer amount of time. It can be challenging to worship with children when much of the worship service is above their developmental level! But, oh how the value of gathering with children in worship outweighs the challenges we face in doing so. Children understand the sign of the cross, for example, without an explanation. Actually, it may do the adults some good to experience worship with all of their senses – sight, sounds, touch, taste, and smell. This type of worship just might occur if we put children in charge of our churches.

Here are some quotes that come from children who were asked to define worship:

Telling God you love Him Showing God how much you love him Praying to God Singing joyfully Learning about God Believing in God and talking about it Giving things to someone special

I think John Roedel's angel sunbathing on his roof was spot on:

teenagers with faith in *Christ* are already a part of the Church and should be united with other believers

Then wolves will live at peace with lambs, and leopards will lie down in peace with young goats. Calves, lions, and bulls will all live together in peace. <u>A little child will lead them</u>. Isaiah 11:6 Where do teens fit in at church? They are "too old" for Children's Ministry, yet "too young" to participate in many of the ministries of the church. But, we are called to live IN COMMUNITY – to serve each other, love each other, hold each other accountable and learn from each other. Our church community acts as an extended family. The pandemic really disrupted our family. But we are rebuilding, Praise God! Yes, it may seem as though once you are confirmed as a teenager, you may not attend church as much because you don't feel obligated. But that need not be the

case. There is still much work for you and all of our teens to do in today's church. There's lots of people to love and serve and especially LEARN FROM. As a teenager, you may not realize it, but the Pastors, staff and membership are so encouraged when you show up in church. Worshiping in community helps fill all of our hearts with the Holy Spirit. Singing together and hearing the Gospel and sermon refresh us and remind us that we are not alone. Communing together is a very personal and special sacrament to enjoy together. Our church is committed to help teens plug in at church. I challenge you to get into the swing of attending again – when we get out of the rhythm of attending worship, we can get disoriented and lose touch with how important it is. During the pandemic, we stayed away from church in order to protect our physical health, but now it's time to work on our spiritual health. God gave us the church for our benefit, so that we may benefit others. It's at church where we see God's love in action and we feel His presence. It's where we keep grounded to what really matters in life. Those superficial and material things we are surrounded by each day are kept in balance with what is meaningful and eternal.

#### If LCC could speak, here's a message for teenagers:

We honor your feelings.

We encourage you to come as you are.

We will guide you to becoming a participant rather than a spectator, we promise!

We will answer questions for you, just ask.

Keep praying – we pray for you continually.

You are loved and valued here.

Yes, through Christ we all have the right to come to the Father in one Spirit. So now you non-Jewish people are not visitors or strangers, but you are citizens together with God's holy people. You belong to God's family. You believers are like a building that God owns... The whole building is joined together in Christ, and he makes it grow and become a holy temple in the Lord. And in Christ you are being built together with his other people. You are being made into a place where God lives through the Spirit. Ephesians 2:18-22

#### Bless the Lord, O My Soul (TEN THOUSAND REASONS) Text and Music: Matthew Redman, b. 1974 and Jonas Myrin, b. 1982

#### Refrain

Bless the Lord, O my soul, O my soul; worship his holy name. Sing like never before, O my soul; I'll worship your holy name.

- The sun comes up, it's a new day dawning; it's time to sing your song again.
   Whatever may pass, and whatever lies before me, let me be singing when the evening comes.
- 2. You're rich in love, and you're slow to anger. Your name is great, and your heart is kind. For all your goodness, I will keep on singing ten thousand reasons for my heart to find.
- 3. And on that day when my strength is failing, the end draws near, and my time has come; Still, my soul will sing your praise unending ten thousand years and then forever more!

This hymn has been a favorite for our Wednesday night worshippers. It is based on Psalm 103:1-5; "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and do not forget all his benefits---who forgives all your iniquity, who heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the Pit, who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy, who satisfies you with good as long as you live so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's."

According to Matthew Redman and Jonas Myrin, co-composers, it tells us we can never run out or reasons to worship and praise God. 10,000 reasons or more to praise God, praise unending.

Redman is a GRAMMY<sup>R</sup>-Award winning worship leader and song writer. He has been a contributor of our more contemporary worship songs for 20 years. He has toured all over the world. He grew up in England, but now lives in California with his wife Beth and 5 children.

Myrin is a Swedish singer, songwriter and producer based in Los Angeles, CA. He also is a GRAMMY<sup>R</sup>-Award winner with Redman for "Bless the Lord, O My Soul". He has written songs for such as Barbra Streisand and Andrea Bocelli. He has been active in the music profession since the early 2000's.

I know you will like this hymn as we do on Wednesday nights. Come join us sometime and see what the "Wednesday night experience" is all about. You will see a lot of young families and a bit of a different worship experience.

#### Did You Know?

From the "People for Racial Justice" Group Submitted by Marty Halvorson

Marcie R. Rendon is a citizen of the White Earth Nation. Her novels (*Murder on the Red River* and *Girl Gone Missing*) have won the National Pinckley Women's Debut Crime Novel Award and were a Western Writers of America Spur Award Finalist in 2018. Both novels have been donated to the LCC library and give insight into the Native American female writers' mind as well as a glimpse at the culture at the time of their writing. The rough depiction of the interface between the criminal justice system and a young woman attempting to emerge from the tribal life paints a not so pretty picture of the main characters struggle.

A Note from the book *Girl Gone Missing:* The National Crime Information Centre database reported that 2,758 Native women were missing or murdered in 2018. That number grows. In 2019, it is estimated that up to 4,000 Native American women are missing or were murdered in Canada. In the United States the number is estimated to be close to 3,000. The trafficking and murder of women and children, of all races, is a worldwide epidemic. *Girl Gone Missing* skirts around the edges of that story.
