# ATTN: Cross Kids Parents...

You are invited to a very important meeting on May 19 during Coffee Fellowship in the Treehouse. At this meeting you will hear from Katelin, Kristin, Alanna & Kari on some exciting new programming that will be coming in the fall. We need your input, so mark your calendars and we will see you there!



We are in the church season of Easter and during the past weeks we have heard a lot about how Jesus served the disciples through washing feet and breaking bread and sharing wine with them. Sharing a meal in Bible times was a very special thing. It got me thinking about The Love Feast, or Agape Meal, a Christian fellowship meal recalling the meals Jesus shared with disciples during his ministry and expressing the koinonia – or fellowship, participation, partnership, a gift jointly contributed, a collection, a contribution – all of which is enjoyed by the family of Christ. It includes gifts from the Holy Spirit who embraces and

empowers you to do all things. An Agape Meal is not a dinner party, it is an extended family meal about changing the world; enjoying food that nourishes our body and our relationship with others, and the peace meal meaning a space to reflect, feed the hungry, work for reconciliation and connect with nature. Agape love is pure, selfless and self-sacrificing. It always seeks the best for others — even enemies —, at all costs. A beautiful description of agape love is found in the Bible verses of 1 Corinthians 13. Look it up and give it a read, savoring the words and the emotions they evoke. Agape love is not based on any circumstances or feelings. It is unconditional love, acted upon on a regular basis, with no expectation of love in return. *Simply put, it is love in action.* 

# **AGAPE LOVE IS:**

- The love God has for us and the love that he asks us to show Him and other people.
- Loving others because they are children of God like ourselves even if we don't like them. This means we love a person despite his or her flaws or shortcomings.
- Giving to others, sacrificing our time, energy and resources for someone else without expecting anything in return.
- Responding calmly when faced with difficulties, sacrificing without complaining, and waiting patiently.
- Selfless, and preserves relationships and the growth of another person.
- Not easy, and does not come naturally to most of us.
- A choice we make to serve others with humility, without expecting anything in return.
   This type of love enables us to love the unlovable and serve people at their deepest need, whether they deserve it or not.
- The second of Jesus' greatest commandments.
- More than a feeling; it is an act of the will.

For me, the really neat thing about God's love is that it's not really a feeling for Him—he can't fall out of love with us! Yep, He even loves us when we are grumpy to messing up. He loves us no matter what. What is challenging for us is to loving others that same way. We are to love God, ourselves, our family, our friends, our neighbors, and yes, even our enemies. Learning to live with Agape Love takes a long time and also takes God's help. So, let's learn and grow in God's special love together!

# HERE'S 6 WAYS:

## 1. Grow as a Christian:

Read 1 Peter 3:18. Talk about watching our kids grow, not only in age, but in Christ. Maybe plant some sunflowers and discuss how we need to tend to them and they will grow up high to show the world their beauty, just as we tend to our spirituality and grow to show the beauty of Christ to others.

# 2. God can use YOU to help others! Read

Matthew 6:25-34 and talk about how God takes care of His creatures. Single out birds and ask how we can help them. Then build, create and fill a bird feeder. Sometimes God uses US to help take care of the birds. We can also take care of each other by looking for ways to help those who are hurting. We can for sure keep them in our prayers!

# 3. God cleans us from our sins:

Read 1 John 1:9 and talk about how we all sometimes mess up. Go outside after a rain (or take the hose and make your own) and play in some mud puddles. Think of your sins as the mud you are playing in. When you are finished with your fun, wash all the mud away., remembering that Jesus washes away our sins—all we need to do is ask for forgiveness.

# 4. God pours blessings into our lives:

Read James 1:17 and share the blessings you have received from God. Together, make a list of your blessings. Put some water in a basin and use sponges to 'soak up' water like blessings and love from God.

# 5. God helps us SOAR!

Read Isaiah 40:28-31. Discuss what it says about soaring, then go outside and do some running. Note how we get tired when we run and we need to rest. Life can be like that, too—we can get tired when we hear bad news or get stressed or anxious. But the good news is that God promises to renew our strength—not only does He help us run, He helps us soar!

### 6. God wants us to serve others:

Read John 13:5-17. Take a look at your feet and talk about how dirty people's feet got during Jesus' time. Washing feet was for the lowest servants because it was a yucky job. But Jesus took the time and care to wash his disciples' feet. He set an example for us—the best way to show love to others is by serving. Take a walk and pick up some trash as a way to serve those in your neighborhood.

# **ELW #879 For the Beauty of the Earth (DIX)**

Text: Folliot Stanford Pierpoint; Music: Conrad Kocher ELW 879 For the Beauty of the Earth

- For the beauty of the earth, for the beauty of the skies,
   For the love which from our birth over and around us lies:
   Christ, our God, to thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise.
- 2. For the wonder of each hour of the day and of the night, Hill and vale and tree and flow'r, sun and moon and stars of light: Christ, our God, to thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise.
- 3. For the joy of ear and eye, for the heart and mind's delight, For the mystic harmony linking sense to sound and sight: Christ, our God, to thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise.
- 4. For the joy of human love, brother, sister, parent, child, Friends on earth and friends above; for all gentle thoughts and mild: Christ, our God, to thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise.
- 5. For each perfect gift of thine, peace on earth and joy in heav'n; For thyself, best gift divine, to our world so freely giv'n. Christ, our God, to thee we raise this our sacrifice of praise.

Folliot Sandford Pierpoint is the author of this great hymn. Folliet was born October 7, 1835 in Bath, England. After graduating from Cambridge, he taught at Somersetshire College in his home area of Bath.

One day when he was 29, Folliot found himself walking in the countryside on a beautiful spring day near Bath. He saw the ocean of green, the blue dome of heaven, and the winding Avon River cutting through the flowery landscape. Overwhelmed with God's creative brilliance, he wrote this poem. He intended it primarily for Communion service in the Anglican Church, but when it jumped the Atlantic, it quickly became associated with the American Thanksgiving holiday.

Little else is known about Folliot Sandford Pierpoint. He resigned from his position at Somersetshire, and apparently moved from place to place, teaching some, writing hymn, and publishing his poetry. He died in 1917.

"For the Beauty of the Earth" is one of only a few songs devoted purely to giving thanks. One of the strange things about the "attitude of gratitude" is that we tend to exhibit it in reverse proportion to the number of blessings received. The more we have, the less thankful we are. This hymn reminds us of the immense beauty of the earth that God created for our use and enjoyment. And too, a reminder to be thankful for all of our blessings, large and small.



Conrad Kocher was a German composer (1786-1872). He was a musician who started a School of Sacred Song in Stuttgart in 1821, where they encouraged part-singing in congregations. It was also influenced by Haydn, Mozart, Clementi, and Palestrina. In addition to hymn tunes, he composed instrumental music, and oratorio, two operas, and a written work on church music called *Die Tonkunst in der Kirche* (1823).

# Thursday, May 9, 12:00 Noon



# Let's Talk

From the "People for Racial Justice" Group Submitted by Marty Halvorson

When you look at your life what would you say is your most significant accomplishment? For many of us who have had successful jobs we might think of our work as at the top of the list. But what often comes first is that we have given our best at raising children, guiding them as best we could. I know in our family we have had all kinds of advantages with quality day and health care, educational opportunities and advantages with home and church. We never had to worry about whether our children would be taken from us and disappear.

Archeologists in Nebraska, at a remote boarding school, are trying to find the bodies of dozens of children who died there and have been lost for decades. Crews with shovels are searching for unmarked sites where ground-penetrating radar suggested a possible location for the cemetery of the Genoa Indian Industrial School. Genoa was part of a national system of more than 400 Native American boarding schools that attempted to integrate Indigenous people into white culture. This was done by separating children from their families and cutting them off from their heritage.

The school, about 90 miles west of Omaha, opened in 1884 and at its height was home to nearly 600 students from more than 40 tribes across the country. Newspaper clippings, records and a student's letter indicate at least 86 students died at the school, usually due to diseases such as tuberculosis and typhoid. You will not find these statistics recorded in any of our history books. The raising of our children had it's bumps and problems, but we never had to be concerned in the way Indigenous families had to be.

Toning with a Purpose has been a wonderful way to share the mission of Smile Train with



others. This season, my toning partners have donated \$620 = 2.5 cleft surgeries. Since "Toning With a Purpose" began in December 2016, participants have donated \$3,341.00 = 13+ surgeries. If we were included in all matched funds, that number would go to 41 children whose lives have been changed forever. Thank you, Lord, for Smile Train, their mission, and this opportunity to share. # CREATION CARE

"America's first Earth Day was on April 22, 1970, and it led to the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act, and the Endangered Species Act. But LCC celebrated it on Sunday, April 14, reminding us that we are connected to and dependent on all of nature - God's creation. Earth Day honors its founder, the late U.S. Senator from Wisconsin, Gaylord Nelson, who said, "The ultimate test of man's conscience may be his willingness to sacrifice something today for future generations whose words of thanks will not be heard." In recognition of Earth Day at LCC, displays were creatively arranged in the narthex to give information on plastic waste, recycling dos and don'ts, and several of our young people engaged people in conversation and handed out informational flyers.

Standing in front of Drey Loge's display of typical plastic waste are Birdie Morsch and Rula Morsch, granddaughters of LCC members Rod and Lori Schneller, holding up examples of unrecyclable plastics and handing out flyers. Lola Chase is shown with the poster she created depicting the various single-use plastic waste clogging our oceans. She feels sad that turtles and birds are dying from ingesting the plastic that breaks down into small pieces, and wants to do something about it. Birdie and Rula like to pick up trash that people dump, and want everyone to be encouraged to recycle and reuse things. Outside, the big attraction was Rory Stumvoll's dump truck, accompanied by a sign that read THE AMOUNT OF PLASTIC THIS TRUCK COULD HOLD ENTERS OUR OCEANS EVERY 60 SECONDS. Rori and his family are standing in front of the truck. The visuals of this were shocking, and made for some good conversation among the congregation.

We are thankful to Drey Loge, CEO and President of Waste Partners, Inc. and to Rory Stumvoll, owner of Stumvoll Excavating, for their help in educating all of us about plastic waste.

# **Property: Dale Peterson**

Here is an update on the 2024 LCC property projects currently underway:

• I contacted four insurance agencies to obtain competitive quotes on insurance for LCC business property, workers compensation and commercial umbrella coverage. Two of the companies were not able to provide quotes in this current insurance claims environment. I am still working with two companies to finalize and present competitive quotes. Our current insurance coverage continues at an increased cost for 2024.

- The Property Committee met in February to prioritize the property projects and timeframes for 2024.
- This week I met onsite with the contractor who will be removing the steps at the north entrance and installing the handicap accessible ramp. He assured me that the ramp will be completed as early as possible this year. This is a complex project to assure handicap accessibility compliance, adequate spacing, proper railings, and installation of the in-ground heating system.
- LCC spring property clean-up day is scheduled for Thursday, May 2nd. This includes the monument sign plantings, south shrubbery, church grounds, old parsonage lot, and the Memorial Garden.
- A group of volunteers built a new floor under one of the rummage sale storage sheds. Both storage sheds were moved to an area behind the garage. This week volunteers helped grind several tree stumps north and east of the garage. Fill will be brought in and rock from the old parsonage lot will be used to level the ground north of the garage. All this is in preparation to move the two rummage sale pods during the rummage sale set-up week.
